#### Report

The 2<sup>nd</sup> State Conference of IAPSM Karnataka Chapter in collaboration with Intercollegiate Academic Postgraduate Programme (IAPP) was conducted at Yenepoya Medical College, Yenepoya Deemed to be University, Mangaluru on 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> October 2022. It was attended by 251 participants and 26 resource persons.

Dr Poonam R Naik, Organizing chairperson, Professor and Head, Community Medicine delivered the welcome address of the inaugural programme. The delegates were addressed by the national and state IAPSM office bearers. The conference was inaugurated by Dr Nupur Roy, Senior CMO, National Centre for Vector Borne Disease Control, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India. Dr Rajendra KV, Deputy Commissioner, Dakshina Kannada was the guest of honor. Dr Sripathi Rao, Pro vice chancellor, Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) delivered the presidential address. Dr Akshaya K M, Organizing secretary and Additional Professor, Community Medicine delivered the vote of thanks.



The sessions of Day 1 at Yendurance Zone started with "Tuberculosis elimination strategies, challenges and road map" by Dr Shazia Anjum. The session focused on the strategies like Kshaya Muktha Grama, Nikshay 2.0 and Nikshay Mitra implemented by the GOK towards TB elimination were highlighted. The way forward like WHO recommendations towards TB elimination, GOI initiatives and the upcoming tools for TB elimination were also addressed.



The second session of the Day 1 was the Key note address by Dr Pankaj Somani, Senior National Programme Manager from UNDP where he spoke about the vaccine supply management system and barriers to digitization. The role of eVIN the path of achieving SDGs was also highlighted in this session.



The panel discussion on Neglected Tropical Diseases highlighted the importance of One Health and the initiatives taken by the governments and medical colleges towards elimination of Lymphatic Filariasis. The session on Comprehensive Digital HDSS: A step towards building healthcare ecosystem by Dr Abhay S Nirgude focused on the usage of HDSS model in creating a longitudinal database and survey with surveillance.







In the post lunch session on Prevention of Parent to Child Transmission by Dr Lalitha Hande, the focus was on the triple elimination and also on the HIV care model in PPTCT in Karnataka.



Day 2 started with a session on Adult Vaccination. Dr Saju C R shared the experiences of setting up an adult vaccination clinic based on a single window approach. Dr Prashant C Srinivas spoke on the social origins of disease among the marginalized and the concept of "remoteness" faced by them. He spoke about the health systems strengthening required to address these populations.



The panel discussion on Strategizing Preventive Oncology at Community level included Dr M Vijayakumar, Dr Keshava Prasad TS, Dr Gauravi Mishra and Dr Subitha Patil as the panelists. Role of Yenepoya in preventive oncology was highlighted. There were discussions on OMICs, Hub and spoke model in cancer awareness creation, cancer registry, challenges in implementation of cancer control programme in India and role of technology incubators in cancer care.



The prelaunch session on day 2 was handled by the resource persons from NIMHANS, Dr Gautham MS, Dr Arvind BA and Dr Pradeep BS. The importance of mental health promotion among youth through Yuvaspandana programme, life skills training and role of youth federation in imparting support towards implementation of life skills training were discussed. These actions are directly related to the SDGs.





Post lunch on Day 2, Dr Parimala Maroor explained the academic and skill development programmes at SIHFW, Bengaluru. The last session by the UNICEF team and their partner organizations focused on role of midwifery in the roadmap of achieving SDGs. Models of midwifery services, initiatives in Telangana, Andhra Pradesh and Karnataka were discussed.



As a part of the conference, a total of 151 scientific presentations (96 oral and 55 posters) were presented by faculty and postgraduates across the various subthemes of the conference across 24 parallel sessions, thus providing the delegates a rich academic extravaganza.





The valedictory programme of the conference was held on 22<sup>nd</sup> October 2022 at 4 pm. Dr Abhay S Nirgude, Organizing co-chairperson and Associate Dean, Yenepoya Medical College, Professor, Community Medicine delivered the welcome address of the inaugural programme. The proceedings of the conference were presented by Dr Akshaya K M, Organising secretary and Additional Professor, Community Medicine. Dr Indumati, Director, Health and family services, Governemnet of Karnataka addressed the gathering. Dr Kishore Kumar M, District Health and Family Welfare Officer, Dakshina Kannada and Fr Gangadhara Somayaji K S, Registrar, Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) were the guests of honor. Dr M Vijayakumar, Vice chancellor, Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) delivered the presidential address. The session wise best scientific presentations (both oral and poster) that were presented across various sub themes of the conference were awarded with a certificate and a memento. Dr Poonam R Naik, Organizing Chairperson and Professor and Head, Community Medicine delivered the vote of thanks.
